How to use this devotional guide

This time of year can feel like a whirlwind with school events, shopping lists, travel plans, and packed calendars that keep us rushing from one thing to the next. But Advent invites us to pause. In the middle of the busy week, we are reminded to slow down and make room in our hearts and homes for Jesus. Christmas isn't about how much we can accomplish, but about the incredible gift of God coming close to us. As we journey through Advent together, may we take time to breathe, to reflect, and to remember the true wonder of the season, Emmanuel, God with us

“Advent” merely means “the coming” or “the arrival.” We are preparing our hearts to celebrate the birth of Jesus, and to remember that he has promised to come again.

The Advent season begins on the fourth Sunday before Christmas and continues up to Christmas Day or Christmas Eve. One way your family can help celebrate the Advent season is to come together for those four weeks and read God's word together. During the week, you will have the opportunity to do a daily devotion together as a family. If you miss a day, don't feel guilty or try to make it up, just pick up where you left off! It will be encouraging and exciting to do this together as one church family. Our desire is that your family will come together and celebrate the birth of our Savior!

We prepared this devotional to accompany an advent wreath. An advent wreath is one way you can mark the progression of the season. It is made up of five candles symbolizing that throughout scripture we see Jesus Christ as the light of the world. A new candle is lit each Sunday in anticipation of Christmas Eve/Day.

Advent is a time for believers to remember God's promise to send us One who will overcome the world and defeat death.

The candles of the Advent Wreath

Every family is different with how they prepare their hearts for this season. We can prepare in many ways: we decorate our apartments, wrap gifts, watch our favorite movies, drink apple cider, etc. The point is that we prepare our hearts with things we see and hear and taste!

One of the visible ways we can prepare is with the Advent Wreath: five candles in the middle of an evergreen wreath. Each Sunday of Advent and then on Christmas Eve/Day, we light a different candle. As we approach the birth of our Saviour, there is more and more light. Jesus leads us from a world of darkness to a world of light. He is the Light of the World.

Meaning of the wreath

There is symbolism in the structure of the Advent wreath.

- The circle — it has no beginning and no end — just like God. This wheel represents eternal victory through Jesus Christ our Lord. It reminds us of God's love for all of us.
- The evergreen represents the faithfulness of the living God and the hope of eternal life that we have through Jesus.
- The candles represent the light of Christ which came into this world.

Sunday One: the first purple candle — the candle of Hope.

For centuries and throughout the Old Testament, God had told his people that he would fulfill the promise by sending the Savior that all humanity needs.

Sunday Two: the second purple candle — the candle of Peace.

One of Jesus' many titles is the Prince of Peace. He is the means for reconciliation between the Righteous God and his unrighteous people. He is also the means of peace between people, within families, across cultures, generations, classes and nations.

Sunday Three: the pink candle — the candle of Joy.

It is through Jesus Christ that we participate in eternal, abundant life. One of the fruits of his Spirit dwelling in us is joy. How could it be otherwise since nothing can separate us from the love of God through the Savior?

Sunday Four: the third purple candle — the candle of Love, God's love.

While we were yet sinners, his Son Jesus died for us. And now we have been redeemed and adopted into his family as his children. By experiencing God's love for us, we are now made free to love others.

Christmas: the white candle — the Christ candle.

Jesus Christ is the light of the world. In him, we find truth and purpose. He not only died to purchase us as a people for his own possession, he rose from the dead as the pledge that we also shall be raised to a new and everlasting life.

Week 1: Hope

(Light the first purple candle)

We live in a world that, above all else, needs hope. A world where people feel hopeless, and it is really no wonder — just turn on the news — what do you hear? The last few years have been hard, different, and sometimes scary. It is no wonder we live in a world that desperately seeks hope.

Christmas reminds us that we do have hope. Since God first revealed himself to humankind, he has brought us a message of hope. Since the fall (when Adam and Eve ate the fruit in the Garden of Eden), God gave hope that one would come to save them.

Week 2: Peace

(Light the first two purple candles of hope and peace)

This time of year is not one that is normally characterized as one of peace. In fact, between all the social obligations, church meetings, dinners to prepare, gifts to purchase, cookies to bake... it is safe to describe it as often chaotic! This year in particular, there seems to be added elements of more things to do. Last year Christmas looked very different for everyone and it feels like the world is trying to make up for what we missed out on last year. In the chaos of what is going on around us, we need to seek the peace that Jesus brings. We worship the God of peace! Don't get caught up in the chaos. Don't feel stressed, ashamed, embarrassed just trust him. Remember Jesus wants you to step away from the chaos and step into his peace.

In Genesis we see sin enter the world. We see darkness and chaos with disobedience in the Garden of Eden. This disobedience brought condemnation, misery and death as its final outcome. However, we have Jesus! Jesus was obedient. Because of what he did on the cross, there is forgiveness of sins and the end result is eternal life. This is the glorious conclusion we all have if we put our trust in him!

There is hope for peace in Christ because he alone brings righteousness and starves off the judgment from God. Jesus brought peace in the most unexpected ways when he arrived. The Prince of Peace came as a baby in a manger, wrapped in swaddling cloths. Because of his work on the cross, we have peace for our assurance in salvation, but also, we have the peace of mind knowing that God will heal this broken world and will come again. Despite the chaos all around us, despite the sometimes dark, scary and sad world around us, peace from God, true biblical peace, allows us to trust in God's promises.

Week 3: Joy

(Light the first two purple candles of hope and peace and light the pink candle of joy)

During these last few years, it is really tempting to dwell exclusively on the challenges, sacrifices and pain we have all faced amongst this pandemic. We can easily become immersed in these negative, victim-like feelings and be completely oblivious to our many blessings.

It is not uncommon to get happiness confused with joy. Happiness is built around our circumstances. It is often fleeting, it does not last long. Joy, on the other hand, is a deep rooted blessedness that is present no matter what circumstances come your way. Joy comes only when we are in union with Jesus.

Remember that we belong to God. We are his sons. We are his daughters. We are loved beyond measure. We need to remember that the good news of Jesus' birth has the power to bring us great joy! We need to choose joy! Our joy isn't dependent on what is going on in our lives, what's going on in the world, or in the people we are with. It doesn't depend upon the gifts we may have under the tree or even the gifts we give to others. God can use hard things to ground you in the love of God. The joy outlasts pain, suffering, shame. Nothing can shake that joy. If you put your hope in Jesus, you get the peace of Christ. You get to live in joy in the knowledge that you are loved!

It has been over two thousand years since the birth of Jesus and yet, the story of his birth holds that same transforming power. Those who hear the message and believe can walk in joy and peace. Like the shepherds, we can choose to believe, worship and proclaim this good news as we celebrate this Christmas season.

Challenges, pain, sadness can be set aside when eyes are fixed on the eternal truth that there is reason to rejoice. In the end, light wins. Jesus overcame the darkness. Our joy is a gift. It is a gift our Father gave to us that first Christmas in the babe of Jesus.

Week 4: Love

(Light the first two purple candles of hope and peace, the pink candle of joy and the third purple candle of love)

Advent is a beautiful time of year. It is definitely one of the most joyous holidays as we remember the birth of our savior. Christmas is a time to share blessings with one another. It is a time for giving and a time for forgiving. It is also a time to remember how much God loves us.

We know that God loves us because of the gift of Jesus that Christmas morning. It was love that stirred our Father's heart. It was love that caused him to send his son, Jesus, to earth, born in a lowly manger. At Christmas we often focus on this part of the story, babe of Jesus, the nativity. However, we must remember the lengths that God went to show us his love.

Jesus was sent to earth and born to rescue us by sacrificing himself. This is love! Love is shown through the suffering that Jesus endured to save us. Christ felt the physical pain on that cross. He suffered as he was beaten and mocked. He did all of this because of love. Love for you.

Advent Wreath Craft

Materials:

- Paper plate
- Construction paper or colored paper
- Coloring supplies
- Tape or glue
- Scissors

Directions

1. Cut out the middle circle from your paper plate.
2. Color your paper plate ring green, or trace your family members' hands on green paper. Then, cut them out and tape or glue them to the paper plate ring.
3. For your candles, cut out three purple rectangles, one pink rectangle, and one longer white rectangle.
4. Tape or glue your rectangles to the wreath, with the white candle in the middle.
5. During our wreath lighting services, "light" your candles by taping or gluing a small piece of orange paper to each candle.
